Assemblyman Magnarelli serves as Chair of the Assembly's Standing Committee on Local Government and as a member of the Economic Development, Education, and Oversight, Analysis and Investigation committees.

Through the Assemblyman's efforts, the Veterans Parade is expanding to the New York State Fairgrounds on November 5, 2011 and will include a 5K race, band exhibitions and various veterans kiosks representing every branch of the Armed Services.

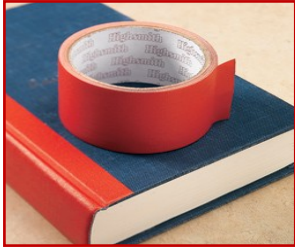

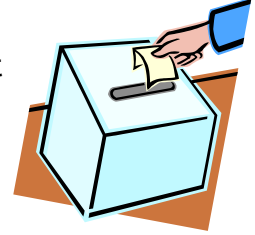

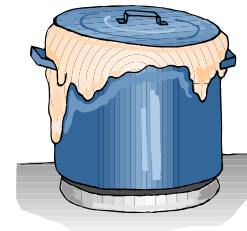




Mohawk Valley Community College libraries have recently begun subscribing to Film on Demand as an economical solution to the high prices of educational DVDs.

Beauchamp Branch of the Onondaga County Public Library is continuing its annual *Cooking Up Literacy* program this summer.

The program won an AWE award last year for its creative approach to encourage healthy eating habits while building literacy and math skills in children 5 to 12 years old.



In eight sessions over four months, young children work with older children and volunteers to first copy down recipes onto recipe cards, then follow the directions of the recipes at the library's kitchen prep stations, and finally share the results and discuss their recipes with everyone at the table. **YUM!**

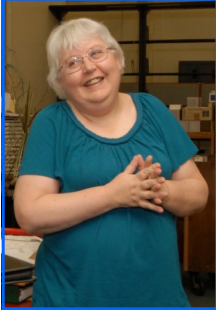

Rome Memorial Hospital received the *Outstanding Leadership Award for Achievements in Eliminating Central Line-Associated Bloodstream Infections*.

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services recognized 37 hospital and healthcare facilities for their efforts to prevent healthcare-associated infections (HAIs), a leading cause of death in the United States. HAIs are infections that are acquired while patients are receiving medical treatment for other conditions. Rome Memorial Hospital is the first to be honored as part of a new national awards program.

Preservation of Scrapbooks, Fayetteville Free Library



On Wednesday, April 27, CLRC's Archival Services Committee sponsored a workshop entitled, "**Preservation of Scrapbooks**" with David Stokoe, Conservation Librarian at Syracuse University.

During this workshop, participants received important tips on how best to go about preserving or conserving their historic scrapbooks. David discussed with participants what sorts of treatments may need a professional conservator and what sorts of treatments a non-conservation professional might engage in themselves.

After a comprehensive presentation from the instructor, participants engaged in a lively Q&A and watched as David demonstrated how easy it can be - with a little practice - to create a box customized to fit a repository's most fragile items.

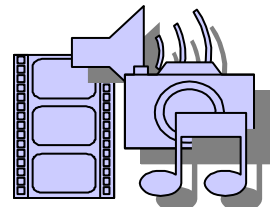
