Masonic Medical Research Lab receives a \$1.75 million grant from the National Institutes of Health.

The Experimental Cardiology team at the Cardiac Research Institute at MMR will conduct an in-depth study of the of causes of atrial fibrillation, a condition causing the heart's upper chambers to contract rapidly and irregularly. The team will also develop effective therapies for this condition.

Members of the Experimental Cardiology team include Drs. Charles Antzelevitch, Alexander Burashnikov, Jonathan Cordeiro, Jose Di Diego, and Andrew Zygmunt.



Thanks to the generous \$15 million gift of the Dineen family, Syracuse University College of Law will be getting a new home. The family has a history with SU's College of Law as both their father Robert Emmet Dineen (class of 1924) and their mother Carolyn Bareham Dineen (class of 1932), graduated from Syracuse University Law. Emulating their parents, all three children -Carolyn Dineen King, Kathryn Dineen Wriston, and Robert E. Dineen Jr. - became lawyers as well.

A Historian's Code

8. I know I have a special responsibility to the truth and will seek, as fully as I can, to be thorough, objective, careful, and balanced in my judgments, relying on primary source documents whenever possible.
9. Life may be short, but history is forever. I am a servant of forever.
